VET NOTES Sharon Hoofnagle D.V.M. A Story with a Lesson

Many years ago local group of riders headed up Thousand Puddles for an overnight camping trip. They set up camp, the horses were grazing on the island, and the folks enjoyed a nice dinner. At dusk they brought the horses in, but Star was missing. They searched the island and the surrounding area- no Star. By around 10 pm they were anxious. The most likely place to find her was back at the trailhead so they decided to pack up and ride out.

As they approached the trailhead they started to joke, hoping Star was enjoying the good grass along the road. But as they rode in the joking turned to dismay- there was no sign of Star. There were a few campers at the trailhead but they denied seeing Star. As they pondered what to do next one of the campers, slightly inebriated, sidled up to them and said he thought he knew where Star was.

With the new info they headed back up the trail and within an hour had found her, stuck but unhurt.

In those days there was an intact bridge across Edfro Creek. It was about 100 ft from the stock crossing. Some slightly tipsy folks had found Star, thought she was lost, and tied her to the back of their atv and headed out to the trailhead. The problem was the bridge was not entirely decked - it only had boards on each side for wheeled vehicles. Star went right off the bridge approach and into the creek.

She wasn't hurt and with some help was able to get out of the creek. It was surprising to the riders that they had ridden close to her in the dark and she hadn't whinnied.

Many folks have good and some not so good stories to tell. But I did learn one thing from this story. When I camp with my horse he has two tags on- one has his home address in Whatcom County, the second has his camp address and the date- for example Spanish Camp- Aug 5-12.

Then I hope if he is lost whoever finds him, finds him before happy hour.

Whatcom Back Country Horsemen General Meeting Minutes Mar 8, 2023

The meeting was call to order at 7:01 pm at the Laurel Grange by Vice President Cindy Piccolo. It was preceded by a 30 min social gathering. The pledge of allegiance was said. The roll call was asked for. Attendees stated their name. Two members attended by zoom.

Our guest speakers were introduced from the Whatcom Conservation District. Corina Cheever – Conservation Planning Coordinator & Farm Planning, described the many programs offered to farms, including planning, education, and incentive programs. Amanda Knauf, Wildfire Resilience Specialist, described programs available and how to minimize wild fire danger on a farm, and advise on evacuation

Approval of this meeting agenda was requested- Andy moved to approve, Carol K seconded. - approved Approval of gen min from Feb 8 2023 printed in newsletter- Verna moved, Sam seconded. Approved.

The general meeting agenda and reports were presented. The agenda topics were: Renewal of cd: report: one cd was up for renewal, the board recommended renewing it, it is held by BCHW. Amount available to members by request.

Website: the website was discussed by the board. It is not being kept up to date. We have discussed dropping it but it is an asset to the club. The web manager donates the website fees and does not charge us. The board voted to continue the website one year,

(The above two topics were due prior to the general meeting- club will vote on ratification)

Baker Lake Trail: (east side of Baker Lake) Bill moved and Andy seconded that WBCH work on the trail. Discussion followed the motion: The main work will be removing puncheon and re-establishing water fords. We also need to advocate for parking; Tim is trying to get the forest service to provide parking, (four spots), possibly using Puget Sound Energy funds. The cost to work on the entire trail is \$400.000. The PNT is logging out the entire trail, WTA is working on the middle section. They will be boated across the lake. We will be working on the south end (the dam end). Whatcom and Skagit are both close enough to provide workers.

A motion was made by Bill M, Andy seconded to pass all three items: the CD renewal, the website renewal, and the Baker Lake trail work. Motion passed.

Directors: Joe R –Ted Neff is the new head of the Mt Baker Ranger District of the Mt Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest, headquarters Sedro Woolley Joe suggested that three chapters, Whatcom, Skagit, and Traildusters host a meet-and-greet event with Ted and all three chapters. The Skagit rodeo grounds would be a good venue. Rendezvous- is coming up Fri, Sat, Sun Mar 17, 18, 19th. Events are Fri and Sat; the membership meeting is Sunday. Deb Cribbs would like a ride. Trail app: Bob and Cathy Iddins described a new trail app called Tread Map that will have a booth. It is an interactive app, people can post photos, trail info. For example, if there is a tree down it can be placed on the map

Store items: Lori Lenox will have store items at Rendezvous. Joe can bring items back members want. There will big a large tack sale.

Volunteer Hrs.: Verna- Feb had 71.5 hrs.

Auction: Melinda: M. gave the timeline: Deadline for value letters/donation-April 22

Donations may begin to be dropped off at Nancy's- April 24th-May 5th

Tagging May 6th

Auction May 13th we need lots of help that day.

A sign-up list for volunteers is being passed around, the jobs were described. Display items, set-up tables and chairs, silent auction set-up and close down, moving items from Nancy's to auction. There are enough helpers for tagging.


