WBCH General Meeting minutes July 12 2023 Misty River Ranch

The meeting was preceded by a potluck and a clinic by Molly McDaniel, head trainer and instructor at Balanced Performance Training. She demonstrated on her mare, Tangy, on how to teach a horse or mule some valuable trail techniques, such as side pass and turns on the front and rear quarters. We had 3 head of stock and their owners that she worked with. Thanks to Bill and Tilly, Andy and Harley, Verna with Mocha.

The meeting was called to order by Roger E

The agenda was approved. The minutes of Junes general meeting were approved as written in the newsletter.

Reports:

Director/legislative: Joe R- State reported that one bank account was compromised by a check-washing scheme, the account was closed. There have also been scam emails.

BCHA has increased by one state- Texas.

Legislative: 2 bills on e-bikes were presented to Olympia, neither passed.

Wine Ride: they are looking for volunteers. Bill, Michelle, Cindy, Verna, and Andy have volunteered in the past. Dues will increase for BCHA by \$5. BCHW has to decide if we should increase dues or just absorb the increase. April is BCHA's 50 yr. anniversary.

Liability release: BCHW is adopting a new procedure for the releases. (Currently we sign a release when we renew our membership) The new procedure will require signing a release for every work party.

Records: we need to keep records currently for 7 years,

Credit cards: Currently Joe, Tim, and Fran have credit cards. Question is who keeps the receipts? Probably the person with the credit card.

We need to keep all records in digital form.

It was questioned if we need the liability forms for the Ferndale parade. We do not, only for club sanctioned events.

Executive committee: Bill announced that Joe is on the state executive committee.

Calendars: Bill has calendars for sale, one was given to Molly

Work coordinator: Roger N- we have a work party scheduled for this Saturday at Saxon; however it may be cancelled due to fire danger. Shut-down rules also apply to battery equipment. The Land Trust will try to haul gravel in August.

Parade: Roger E- Dennis Mauler has to have the paperwork in by July 15th. Dennis has info on the new route.

Y Rd: Sharon- The Mt Baker hwy closure is at the Van Wyck area. North and East County can access Y Rd as usual. People coming from Bellingham on the Mt Baker Hwy should take North Shore.

Roger N: Y Rd: at the work party last Sat Roger and Margaret Hamstra rode the S side by crossing the creek ford, The trail was clear up the hillside. Margaret H. had previously ridden to the old bridge site. They brushed out the trail coming down the hillside below Ogalala. They rode the north side up to the overlook.

Saxon work party: Andy- they put a culvert in to repair a slough-off. Bob, Rocky, Andy and Verna worked. **Vedder**: we ordered the picnic tables.

Helmets: we have purchased 10 plain helmets. We also purchased 5 helmets with ear and eye protection. A Milwaukie helmet with several attachments was discussed. (there are ear protectors in the club trailer)

Triangular bandages: Sharon H. the bandages are an excellent immediate treatment in case of a traumatic wound. They should be carried by anyone operating power equipment.

Funds: Roger E- he questioned if we can donate excess funds to other causes. Bill- the state is very specific on our use of funds. Use has to meet our mission statement. We cannot give funds to other groups outside that statement. Discussion followed on possible uses- we may need funds at Silver Lake.

Silver Lake: Bill-Roger and Bill have studied the Silver Lake barn remodel. Roger E will work on an estimate and bring it back to our group.

North Summit Camp: Verna M.- Verna and Andy camped there for a few days. They were impressed with the camp. Water may continue to be an issue so haul water with you for now.

There was a wooden slat bed in the corner. No problem, I put a piece of canvas down and put my air mattress on top. Everything was great until...












Rocky's packing out trip in the Pasayten in July 2023.

Campfires Banned in All Portions of North Cascades National Park, Ross Lake National Recreation Area, and Lake Chelan National Recreation Area

Sedro Woolley, WA – Effective Monday, July 24, campfires or the ignition of wood, briquettes, or any fuel in fire pits, fire pans and barbeque grills, are banned in all portions of North Cascades National Park Service Complex – North Cascades National Park, Ross Lake National Recreation Area, and Lake Chelan National Recreation Area. This includes all National Park Service lands and campgrounds along State Route 20 as well as Hozomeen and the entire Stehekin Valley. Stoves or grills that are solely fueled by liquid petroleum fuels for the purpose of cooking are allowed in all locations.

The burn ban helps to reduce the chance of human-caused wildfires during an unprecedented drought with prolonged high summer temperatures. Use caution when smoking and do not discard cigarette butts. Discharging, or using any kind of fireworks, tracer ammunition or other incendiary devices in any location on federal lands is always prohibited.

If smoke or flames are visible, dial 911 or report at any ranger station.

Hello Everyone,

Due to the prolonged warm and dry weather along with the increased number of fires in the region. Effective 7/4/2023 at 0001: The Fire Danger Adjective Level will change from High to Very High and the IFPL will change from a 1 to a 2 in zones 653, 656 and 658.

Level 2. Partial hootowl. The following may operate only between the hours of 8 p.m. and 1 p.m. local time: Power saws except at loading sites; Cable yarding; Blasting; Welding or cutting of metal. A one hour fire watch/security is required. A water truck/trailer is required to be on site in designated areas.


